Flexibility Options

Operational approaches school systems and schools can take to implement flexibility in exchange for a performance contract from the State Board of Education

The Big Four

Waivers of state class size, expenditure control, certification, and salary schedule requirements

The Case

1. What will you be able to do with a charter that you can not do without a charter?

Hart County Charter System rationale:

- Serve students with greater flexibility
- Involve community and parents, School Governance Teams, more in decision making in using state and local resources
- Serve students who fall behind and those who excel with Innovative solutions
- Support community needs and as a whole with greater accountability by the school system

Charter System: The Case

Planning Spring - Fall 2013

- Over 50 community and school staff participated in the planning process including some middle school students
- Research Teams studied existing charter systems and areas of need in Hart County Schools
- Summarized research to develope the petition concept to determine waivers needed, the governance structure, and the desired areas of focus for Hart County

Area of Focus

The community, staff and parents indicated the important role of Hart County Schools is to graduate students with strengths in the following areas:

- Sound academic knowledge and skills
- Critical thinking, reasoning and problem solving

- 3. Work ethic enhanced with Social Skills & Citizenship
- Preparation for vocation/skilled employment

2. What are your school system's student performance objectives for the proposed charter term?

Student Performance Goal 1: The percentage of 3rd – 8th grade students meeting or exceeding state standards on each area of the CRCT (Reading, ELA, Math, Science, Social Studies) will exceed the state percentage of students meeting or exceeding on the CRCT by the 2017/2018 school year. We are working to decrease the number of students scoring at Performance Level 1, did not meet, by 50% by 2017-2018.

Student Performance Goal 2: The percentage of 3rd – 8th grade students exceeding state standards on each area of the CRCT (Reading, ELA, Math, Science, Social Studies) will meet or exceed the state percentage of students exceeding on the CRCT by the 2017/2018 school year. We are working to increase the number of student scoring at Performance level 3 by 50% by 2017-2018.

Student Performance Goal 3: The percentage of high school students meeting or exceeding state standards on each EOCT (9th grade Literature, American Literature, Coordinate Algebra/Math I, Analytic Geometry/Math II, Physical Science, Biology, US History, Economics) will exceed the state percentage of students meeting or exceeding on the EOCT by the 2017/2018 school year.

Student Performance Goal 5: The percentage of students meeting or exceeding state standards on the Grade 5 Writing Assessment, Grade 8 Writing Assessment, and Georgia High School Writing Test will exceed the state percentage of students meeting or exceeding on the writing assessments by the 2017/2018 school year.

Student Performance Goal 6: The percentage of students exceeding state standards on the Grade 5 Writing Assessment, Grade 8 Writing Assessment, and Georgia High School Writing Test will meet or exceed the state percentage of students exceeding on the writing assessments by the 2017/2018 school year.

Student Performance Goal 7: The Hart County graduation rate will meet or exceed the state graduation rate by the 2017/2018 school year

5. What is the system's plan to maximize school level governance?

Governance

Local board of education will still be in place with their current rights and responsibilities

Superintendent will still be in place with the same responsibilities

Principals will still be in place with the same responsibilities

Teachers and other staff will still be in place with the same responsibilities

School Councils will mature into School Governance Teams and have new authority

4 Responsibilities of a School Board

Strategic Plan

Budget

Superintendent

Accountability

Adopt a five-year strategic plan

Adopt a budget to fund the strategic plan

Hire a leader to implement the strategic plan within budget

Hold the leader accountable for implementing the strategic plan within budget

School Councils will become School-Based Governance Teams

[Note: The 2014-2015 school councils will be invited to serve the first term.]

Members (6-9) voted to serve on staggered 4-5 year terms

Principal will be the chairperson for the first two years

Teachers (2) will be elected by teachers (principal may appoint 1 teacher)

Parents (2) will be elected by parents

Students (1-2) will be selected by the school-based leadership team

(middle and high only)

Community/business (2) people selected by the school-based governance team

Train as a substitute for the school (optional- to build communication)

School-Level Governance Team Authority

In budget:

Member of the school-level budgeting process

Approve budgeting allocation of the state charter system allocations based on school improvement plan

Approve the Title I school-level budget

Approve recommended fund raiser budget

In resource allocation:

Recommendation of budget allocation at the school level based on guidelines Approve recommended field trips & expenditures of funds

In personnel decisions:

Serve with Superintendent and others on interview team for new principal

Participate in recommendation/ feedback to superintendent regarding new principal from preselected candidate slate

School-Level Governance Team Authority

In monitoring school improvement plans:

Work with leadership team and administration in analyzing and revising school improvement planning


In curriculum:

Review the curriculum program in place and other programs that may be considered for adoption

In school operations:

Serve on school operations procedures review committees such as safety, schedules, budgeting, maintenance, and staffing.

FINANCIAL GOAL 1: To maintain a minimum of 65% of budget expenditures for instructional initiative

determined by School Leadership and School Governance.

FINANCIAL GOAL 2: To evaluate the fidelity of the initiative implementation resulting in student progress

FINANCIAL GOAL 3: To maintain yearly audit statues with no findings.

Actions:

- SGT will determine greatest education need after discussion with School Leadership Team
- Develop an evaluation system to identify the value of expenditures against outcomes
- Review of current expenditures and identify alternative spending using the charter system waiver
- Develop a process for school-level governance teams to provide input into the budget process
- Develop a system to tie expenditures back to specific school and district goals
